


Existing Conditions

The community first attracted settlers from Scotland, via Ontario, and immigrants from Eastern Europe followed. The Town of Mundare was founded in the early 1900's and has a rich Ukrainian culture and history evident throughout the community and the surrounding area. The members of the Order of St. Basil, commonly called the *Basilian Fathers*, have been involved in extensive pastoral and cultural work among the Ukrainian people since their arrival in Alberta at the turn of the century. The Basilian settlement in Mundare became a very important center not only for the diocese but also for the Ukrainian Catholic Church in North America.

Mundare is home to Stawnichy's Meat Processing, a sausage factory that has been in the community for 50 years and is famous for their Kielbasa (Ukrainian sausage). In 2001, the town erected the world's largest Kielbasa monument commemorating a century of sausage making.






